

### **How is Budget Made?**

Budget is an important Fiscal Policy document encompassing estimated receipts and expenditure of the Provincial Government for a financial year. It also spells out the Government's development priorities and commitments.

Article 120 of the Constitution of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan, 1973 mandates the Provincial Government to prepare and lay its Annual Budget Statement in respect of every financial year before the Provincial Legislature for approval. It aims at prudent and optimal utilization of Government revenues for effective public service delivery and development needs of the Province.





### **Inclusive Budgeting for FY 2022-23**



To promote financial transparency and to ensure participator/ accountable governance, Finance Department organized a Pre-Budget Seminar on "Inclusive Budgeting" on February 24, 2022, which was attended by representatives of the civil society, academia, media, non-governmental organizations and international financial institutions. The representatives identified and proposed key interventions in socio-economic sectors particularly Education, Health, Social Protection, Agriculture, Human Resource Development, and Local Governance. Besides, budgetary proposals were also received from the citizens of Punjab through e-mail. Citizens' preferences have been reflected in the Budget 2022-23.





### Fiscal Discipline & Austerity Measures

As a matter of policy, the Provincial Government has decided to observe utmost austerity in the usage of public money through prudent financial management, observance of financial discipline, judicious reduction in the Current Expenditure without compromising essential service delivery and organizational functions.

- Ban on purchase of new vehicles except ambulances, buses for educational institutions, tractors/ trollies, dumpers etc for solid waste disposal, motorcycles and vehicles for development schemes and foreign funded schemes by PDWP or higher forum
- Ban on air travel and treatment abroad at Government's expense
- Ban on hiring of contingent paid staff except in extremely emergent cases
- Ban on holding seminars/ workshops at private hotels/ restaurants out of public funds
- Ban on up-gradation of posts except the powers as prescribed under relevant rules


