In Scheme No. 190 of the Five-year Post war Development Scheme of the Punjab Government it was decided that cue to the advanced stage of the work on irrigation schemes relating to Haveli and Thal, adequate road communications be provided within these areas to enable agricultural produce from areas already under irrigation by the Thal Project to be transported to rail head. Due to the War and other circumstances the Thal Project Canals were placed in a low category and they were not expected to be ready for sometime to come with the result that the Road programme in this area was shown down now due to the partition of the Punjab and influx of refugees, it is desired by Government that the Thal Project canals should be given a special priority. Accordingly two survey Sub-Divisions (one at Lahore and the other at Mianwali) with necessary staff were created in January 1948 up to February and March 1948, respectively,

to do the work of surveying Provincial Highway from Wanbachran to Muzaffargarh and from Harnoli to Muzaffargarh.

Distribution and adjustment of expenditure on works of common interest between the East and West Punjab Governments, Public Works Department Electricity Branches,—Demand Rs. 12,34,840'

At the time of partition of Punjab Province "The Punjab Partition (Mandi Hydro-Electric System Operation) Order, 1947" was issued by the Partition Department. As the Mandi Hydro-Electric Scheme covered areas which fell within the territories of the two new Provinces of East Punjab and West Punjab the Partition Order provided inter-alia that the working of Hydro-Electric system should continue after the partition and that the expenditure on portions of works of common interest after the partition date, i.e., 14th August 1947, be pooled together and distributed between the two zones at the ratio prescribed therein. The works of common interest as the order referred to are detailed below:—

- (1) Working expenses on Power House and allièd works in Mandi State.
- (2) Expenditure of the Establishment of the Hydro-Electric, Jogindarnagar.
- (3) 132 kV Transmission and Telephone Lines from Jogindarnagar to Shalamar.
- (4) 66 kV Transmission and Telephone Lines from Shalamar to Ferozepore.

- (5) Establishment and working expenses of Divisional Office of Executive Engineer (M. & T.).
- (6) Twenty-five per cent of the salary of Senior Substation Engineer for his work as Power Controller.
- (7) Depreciation charges on the capital invested on lines and works of common interest.
- (8) Interest on the capital invested at 4 per cent on lines and works of common interest.
- 2. The ratio originally fixed for distributing the pooled expenditure was 43 · 45 for East Punjab as against 73 · 39 for West Punjab. As a result of the award of the boundary commission this ratio was revised and works out to 48 · 007 for East Punjab and 68 · 949 for West Punjab.
- 3. According to the partition order the pooled expenditure after division of the province had to be adjusted between the two Governments; but the Chief Engineer, East Punjab Public Works Department, Electricity Branch, billed us first for Rs. 6,39,255 covering a period from 15th August, 1947 to 22nd/30th November 1947 and has now sent a bill for Rs. 12,11,005 up to 22nd/31st December 1947 including the previous period, without any details. Further bills is/are likely to be sent by him for the remaining period of the current financial year. In the absence of any details a sum of Rs. 5,00,000 has been paid to the East Punjab Government under protest.
- 4. In order to cover the expenditure involved it is roughly estimated that funds to the extent of Rs. 15,00,000 would be required for the entire period of 15th August 1947 to 31st March 1948. Out of this sum Rs. 2,65,160 can be met from savings within the sanctioned grant for the current financial year, and a supplementary demand for Rs. 12,34,840 is submitted.
- 5. A separate minor head Cost of Power supplied from the Uhl River Scheme under the major head has been opened and the Accountant-General, West Punjab, has been requested to book this expenditure against that head of account.

The amount will however be met from the savings within the grant.

Establishment required for the Estimating Sub-Division, Shahpur Branch, for a period of 3 months,—Demand Rs. 2,150 (Voted) (Non-recuring)

Shahpur Branch was constructed about 20 or more years back, but it was not opened for irrigation, and was, therefore, abandoned for the time being. Now it has been deemed necessary by Government to open this canal after re-conditioning all its banks, repairing other masonry works and bringing to its original condition as far as practicable.

The tract which will be brought under irrigation is now being served by certain private canals owned by certain family of an Estate. It is understood that besides charging Chaharmi from the tenants or other owners, they also charge certain water rates. Applications from different Zamindars are pouring in daily to save them from the landlordism of the private owners of these canals and bring this area under irrigation from Government channels.

A special sub-division, with necessary staff, required for preparing estimates of Shahpur Branch and flood protection embankment has, therefore, been sanctioned for a period of three months with effect from 1st February 1948.

The expenditure involved during the current year will be Rs. 2,150 which will be met out of the existing grast.

Creation of a temporary Project Division with 2 Sub-Divisions in the Central Bari Doab Circle,—Demand Rs. 15,830 (Voted) (Non-recurring)

In order to take over immediately works of Project Sub-Division of 1st Bhakra Civil Circle on the eve of partition, it was found necessary to hand over this charge to some Divisional unit and as all the other Divisions were fully occupied, there was no other alternative but to, open a new Division to take over the said sub-division. In addition to above, this Divivision will be required to investigate and prepare projects particularly those concerning hydro-electric development. As such, the Project Division with necessary staff, has been sanctioned up to 28th February 1949.

The expenditure involved during the current year will be Rs. 15,830 which will be met out of the existing grant.

Lump sum payment to the staff of the Central Workshops, Amritsar, engaged by the West Punjab Government for the period from 15th August1947 to 31st March 1948,—Demand Rs. 2,23,820 (Non-recurring)

The salaries, etc., of the optees of the Central Workshops, Amritsar, who were originally employed on contract, monthly and daily rated basis, are to be paid by the West Punjab Government for the period from 15th August 1947 to 29th February, 1948. Their services have been terminated by regular notices. The expenditure involved is Rs. 2,23,820, which will be met out of the existing grant.

Creation of supervisory and other temporary posts for the Steel and General Mills, Moghalpura, Irrigation Workshops Division,— Demand Rs. 7,270 (Non-recurring)

The Steel and General Mills, Moghulpura, were acquired by I. B. at the close of the financial year, i. e., on 2nd January 1948. The mills for the present have been allotted as a temporary measure for a period of one year in the first instance and the premises, which were abandoned in August 1947, are being cleaned and put into working order by employing exemployees of Central Workshops, Amritsar.

Full scale establishment has, therefore, not yet been employed and provision for the establishment actually engaged has been made in the schedule.

The expenditure involved during the current year will be Rs. 7,270 which will be met out of the existing grant.

Creation of a Project Circle with a Division and 3 sub-divisions with effect from 10th March 1948 up to 28th February 1949,—Demand during 1947-48,—Rs. 1,450 (Non-recurring)

The programme of hydro-electric development in the West Punjab was considered by Government on 15th February 1948 and it was decided to undertake the following projects as soon as their surveys are completed.

- 1. The Mianwali Project.
- 2. The Ghazi Project.

Provision to the extent of Rs. one crore has been made in the budget for the year 1948-49, for the above new hydro-electric Projects and the Dargahi Project.

2. The existing Project Division in the Central Bari Doab Circle cannot deal with the above projects, and it has, therefore, been decided after thorough consideration, to open immediately a new Project Circle with one division and 3 sub-divisions. The existing project division in the Central Bari Doab Circle will be transferred to the New Project Circle. The Superintending Engineer of the new Circle will prepare the estimates and carry out all detailed work in connection with the above projects. The cost during the year 1947-48 is estimated at Rs. 1,450 and will be met out of the existing grant.

Creation of a temporary Survey Division with 2 Sub-Divisions in the Thal Project Circle,—Demand Rs. 1,500 (Non-recurring)

It was decided by the Government that the work on the Thal Project should be expedited giving a target date of 2 years for the completion of the Project as a whole. Thus a major part of stage III will have to be completed, and schemes for the same prepared in 1948-49. This work can, therefore, only be speeded up if the survey of Main Line Lower below 68,500 and of its distributary system is completed as expeditiously as possible. As the existing Divisions in the Thal Project Circle are heavily worked, it was not possible to entrust this work to any of these Divisions. In order to achieve this end the opening of a new Division to be called Survey Division with 2 Sub-Divisions with the necessary staff has been sanctioned with immediate effect up to 28th February 1949.

The expenditure involved during the current year will be Rs. 1,500 which will be met out of the existing grant.

Special grant to St. Deny's School, Murree, -Rs. 9,000 (Non-recurring)

There is at present no Kindergarten Training College in Pakistan similar to the one run at St. Bedes, Simla. Such a college is really needed in Pakistan for the reason that St. Bedes is no longer accessible and that the training imparted in such a college is considered highly beneficial. There is likely to be a progressively greater demand for such trainees. The girls take the Teachers' Certificate at the end of two years. Thereafter they are absorbed in Convents, Anglo-Indian Schools and other progressive institutions. These trainees can be usefully employed in our Girls' Normal Schools also. The authorities of St. Deny's School, Murree, are prepared to start such a centre with effect from 1st April 1948 at this school provided an initial grant of Rs. 2,000 to meet the initial equipment and repairs to the buildings is given by Government. The centre will be open to the whole of the Western Pakistan and a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 12 girls will be available for admission to the centre each year. Muslim girls will be taken in this centre for training.

The authorities of the St. Deny's School, Murree, are also prepared to take over the Girls School, Ghoragali, from the next term provided a special grant of Rs. 7,000 is given to the school for the initial equipment, etc. This will relieve Government of a considerable amount of expenditure at present incurred in running the Girls School at Ghoragali.

It is proposed to give a special non-recurring grant of Rs. 9,000 to the St. Deny's School, Murree, during the current financial year to meet the initial expenditure on equipment, etc. It is possible to meet this expenditure from the existing sanctioned grant under "37—Education (European and Anglo-Indian Education)". Accordingly a token demand of Rs. 10 is presented.

Special grants to aided colleges in the West Punjab, Rs. 50,000 (Non-recurring)

Owing to the disturbances following the partition of the Punjab nearly all the Hindu and Sikh students of the various arts colleges in the West Punjab have migrated to the East Punjab. The enrolment in the non-sectarian colleges has consequently fallen considerably. The colleges have thus suffered heavily on account of loss in their income from fees. In fact they are not in a position to carry on efficiently unless some financial help is afforded to them by Government. The influx of Muslim refugee students from the East Punjab, has, on the other hand, swelled the enrolment of some of the Muslim colleges and has thus been a cause of additional expenditure to such institutions. Help is also needed for institutions like the M. A. O. College, which has been rehabilitated in the West Punjab and the Islamia College, Gujranwala, which has absorbed the displaced students of the two local colleges at considerable expenses. A sum of Rs. 50,000 (non-recurring) will be required to afford help to the various colleges in the West Punjab during current fiancial year. This amount will, however, be met from savings within the grant ,

Items (2), (3) and (4)

Compensatory grants to non-Government Institutions and stipends to indigent refugee scholars,—Rs. 2,60,000 (Non-recurring)

Owing to the disturbances following the partition of the Punjab a large number of Muslims were compelled to migrate from the East to the West Punjab and most of them lost all their property. It is, therefore, not possible for them to meet the educational expenses of their children, who, prior to migration, were receiving education in the East Punjab institutions. In order to enable the children of such refugees to continue their studies in the West Punjab, it is proposed to spend about Rs. 4 lakhs on deserving refugee students during the year 1947-48. The educational institutions both Government and privately managed will guarantee full fee concessions to 25 per cent, half fee concessions to another 25 per cent and stipends to about 10 per cent of the refugee students.

2. The exemption from fees in Government institutions will amount to a loss of Rs. 1,41,000 on the corresponding receipt head while Government will pay compensatory grants to non-Government institutions to the extent of Rs. 1,08,000 as under:—

To compensate the managements of the privately managed institutions for loss in fee income, Government will pay them special grants on the condition that are equal amount is borne by them on these fee concessions.

3. The award of stipends to about 10 per cent of the refugee students will be at the rate of Rs. 6 in Anglo-Vernacular classes, Rs. 20 in Arts Col-

leges and Rs. 25 in Professional colleges. This will involve an expenditure of Rs. 1,52,000 as detailed below:—

Manufacture of Sera and vaccine for the effective control of contagious diseases amongst livestock

A sum of Rs. 4,520 was sanctioned for the manufacture of sera and vaccine (anti-rinderpest serum) at the West Punjab Veterinary College, Lahoré. This has been necessitated by the failure of Indian Veterinary Research Institute, Izatnagar, to arrange the supply of sera and vaccine as heretofore. Appointment of Secretary to the Industrial Planning Committee—Rs. 2,140 (R)

Industrial Development in the Province is a crying need of the day. The Government has therefore set up an ad hoc committee called the Industrial Planning Committee, for which a wholetime Secretary is considered very essential in order to have speedy results. The expenditure involved in the appointment of the Secretary will be met from the savings within the head. Accordingly a token demand is presented.

Appointment of Textile Engineer—Rs. 750 (N.-R.)

In order to organise the Cotton Ginning Factories and Mandis in the West Punjab and to help the factories in technical matters, a post of Textile Engineer has been created for a period of six months with effect from the 27th November 1947. Now the scheme embraces the vocational aspect also. The West Punjab Government has agreed to share the cost of the scheme with the Government of Pakistan in the ratio of 40:60. The total cost of the scheme amounts to Rs. 5,03,000 of which the West Punjab Government's share is Rs. 2,00,400 which can be met from savings within the grant. Accordingly a token demand is presented.

Improvements to Government House, Lahore, - Demand Rs. 28,530

As the major head 50—Civil Works (Charged) has been merged in the head 50—Civil Works (Voted) from the 15th August 1947, the grant under the former head has been surrendered in full and the funds required for expenditure on Government House, Lahore, under "Improvements" are now demanded according to anticipated expenditure under head 50—Civil Works (Voted). The demand of Rs. 28,530 for the current financial year is made up as follows:—

Works connected with Refugee Camps,—Demand Rs. 6,31,150

- 1. The problem of refugee camps started on 11th August 1947 when refugees from Amritsar district began to pour into Lahore in very large numbers. At first Camps at Walton Nos. 1, II and III were opened. The camps in the districts were also opened to deal with the mass of refugees coming from other districts in the East Punjab to the West Punjab. This necessitated the undertaking of various major works such as construction of refugees camp at Suleimanke, Kasur, Montgomery, Arifwala, Burewala and at Vihari, providing water supply and latrines in different camps, addition and alterations to water supply, drainage and sanitary fittings in Walton Camps, installation of hand pumps in various refugees' camps and for refugee caravan to Sind, etc.
- 2. Due to the extreme urgency of the works these were started in anticipation of the provision of funds and Finance Department's approval. The position is being regularised separately.

3. A sum of Rs. 6,31,150 is proposed to be spent during the year 1947-48 and a further sum of Rs. 1,21,900 during the year 1948-49. The latter amount has already been included in the Budget Estimates for 1948-49 through budget notes.

Construction of new Sessions and Civil Courts in the Jind House Compound, Lahore,—Demand Rs. 35,000.

The existing accommodation being inadequate it had been under consideration for the last ten years to build additional Civil and Session courts buildings at the Jind House, Lahore. But owing to war conditions, etc., the scheme could not materialize and some of the courts (small cause courts) had to be housed in a leased Postal Department building known as Old Postal Stock Depot on the Lower Mall, Lahore. As this building was to be returned to the Postal Department on the termination of the latest lease agreement that is during September 1947, it was decided to construct new courts rooms for six Sub-Judges almost immediately at a cost of Rs. 1,88,300.

There being no provision in the Budget Estimate for 1947-48 for the Joint Punjab, Finance Department's concurrence was duly obtained in May last to incur the expenditure in anticipation of the vote of Assembly and the work commenced accordingly. Due to partition of the Province the requirements of the Department concerned were reduced and as such the construction of only one storey with a total cost of about Rs. 85,270 was considered

enough to serve the purpose for the present, against the estimate for construction of a double storeyed building. Unfortunately the work was omitted to be included in the revised Budget Estimate for the period 15th August 1947 to 31st March 1948. Excluding a sum of Rs. 50,270 which was incurred up to 14th August 1947 and is debitable to the Joint Punjab Account, a sum of Rs. 35,000 will be required during the current financial year.

Purchase of Military Buildings constructed on Government land for use as Police Wireless Station, Lahore,—Demand Rs. 30,700.

Owing to the considerable interference caused by the presence of D. C. Current in Lahore it was considered to locate the Provincial Police Wireles & Centre somewhere outside the D. C. electric supply area. A very suitable site has been found in the Army Recruits Reception Camp which is situated on Government land close to the Cantonment Railway Station. The land was originally acquired for the New Police Lines, Lahore. The Camp was taken over from the Military in November 1947. The cost of the camp was fixed at Rs. 30,700 jointly by the P. W. D. and the local Military Authorities. It is therefore necessary that the Recruits Reception Camp should be purchased at a cost of Rs. 30,700 during the year 1947-48.

Constructing Jalalpur-Tanda Road,—Demand Rs. 5,000.

The area in the north of Gujrat is very fertile but lacks means of communications, with the result that agricultural produce cannot easily be transported to important Mandis. The inhabitants of the area have to undergo considerable hardships and heavy losses especially during rainy seasons when the unmetalled class II roads, which are the only means of communications in the area, become impassable.

This road has also become important from strategic point of view being on the Kashmir border. Construction of suitable means of communications is therefore a great necessity. Since a metalled road already exists from Jalalpur to Gujrat the construction of a road on this portion will provide a through route from Gujrat to Tanda which is situated on the border line.

This road was proposed for construction during 1948-49 but due to strategic reasons at the instance of the Civil Authorities, it has been decided to take it in hand immediately.

The estimated cost of the Work is Rs. 2,48,400 out of which a sum of Rs. 5,000 is proposed to be spent during 1947-48 and Rs. 1,00,000 during the year 1948-49. The latter amount has already been included in the next year's estimate through the Schedule of new Expenditure.

Providing Second Circuit of 6.6 KV Line between Shahdara Power House and Shahdara Grid Substation

In September 1947, supply of Hydro-Electric Power from the Generating Station, Shannan (Mandi State) was interrupted for a period of one week on account of heavy rains and floods in the Uhl River Valley and as things stand at present, continuity of electric supply by the East Punjab Government is also uncertain. It is, therefore, proposed to provide a second 6.6-KV feeder between Shahdara Power House and Shahdara Grid Substation for transmitting power to Lyallpur from the Thermal Generating Station at Shahdara in the event of interruption of longer duration in future or supply being cut off by the East Punjab Government from the Uhl River Scheme. The estimated cost of the work is Rs. 25,300, approximately, which will be met out of the existing grant.

Control of electric supply undertakings abandoned by non-Musli m evacuees,—

In order to carry on the business of the Electric Supply Undertakings which have been abandoned by non-Muslim licensees, the control of which has been assumed by the Public Works Department, Electricity Branch, in exercise of the powers conferred by the West Punjab, Rehabilitation Department, staff has to be employed at a cost of Rs. 4,500. This expenditure is in the first instance debited to the Provincial revenues and ultimately recovered from the income of these undertakings. The net demand is shown as nil.

Provision of Air Raid Precautions in West Punjab,—Rs. 740 (Non-recurring)

On the partition of the Punjab the entire work of winding up of Air Raid Precautions accounts was entrusted to the East Punjab Government and no funds were, therefore, provided in respect of Air Raid Precautions under the head "57—Miscellaneous—K—Expenditure on Air Raid Precautions" in the Budget Estimates for the period from the 15th August 1947 to the 31st March 1948.

2. It has recently been decided to provide measures for the protection from air raids and accordingly an Air Raid Precautions Officer has been appointed with effect from the 17th February 1948. He has been entrusted with the work of preparing an Air Raid Precautions Scheme for the Province and its execution. In order to meet the expenditure on account of his pay, travelling and other allowances, for the period from 17th February 1948 to the 31st March 1948, a sum of Rs. 740 will be required. A sum of Rs. 730 will be met from savings within the grant and accordingly a token demand is presented. The question of how much of the expenditure will be met by the Central Government is still under consideration.
